#### **General Information**

You may email your child's teacher or any employee by using the first initial of the individual's first name + the full last name. #### Attendance Policy

#### Tardy

Our instructional day begins at 7:45 a.m. When students are tardy, they interrupt class and miss important explanations of what the instructional day. Car riders should be dropped off between 7:00 AM and no later than 7:30 AM if they wish to eat breakfast. Children should be in the classroom and ready to begin work before the tardy bell at 7:40 a.m. If students are not in class before 7:40 AM from breakfast or from home, then they are tardy. When children arrive after 7:40 a.m., the parent must sign in the student in the front office. The student will then take a tardy pass to the teacher.

#### **Attendance**

All students are expected to be in attendance each day unless they are ill. Students will be allowed no more than ten (10) general absences during the 180day school year. Of course, situations do occur that prevent students from coming to school. As school officials, we understand that these absences are necessary and, therefore, accept them as excused absences. A note is required for all absences and must be submitted within (5) days from the date of return to school. The note must be signed by a parent/guardian and state the reason for the absence. Legitimate documents for medical excuses must be signed by a licensed/certified health practitioner. Parents are encouraged to schedule health appointments for students after school hours so as to not miss valuable instruction.

Truancy is not permitted under any circumstance. The parents of students with unacceptable or excessive absences or tardies will be called for a Truancy Intervention Plan. A student ages 6 to 17 years who has three consecutive unlawful absences or a total of five unlawful absences is considered truant as defined by state board of education regulation.

If you must take your child from school before the end of the school day, you must send a note to the child's teacher the morning of the early dismissal.

The note must state the reason for, and specify the time of, the early dismissal. Afternoon dismissal begins at 2:30 PM and car riders will be picked up in the car rider area. For safety reasons, NO signouts will be allowed after 1:30 PM. Parents of car riders are asked to not park in the car rider area until after 2:00 PM due to safety reasons.

#### **Permission to Leave School**

We DO NOT allow students to leave the school grounds without being accompanied by a parent or a designated adult listed on your child's information form. Also, anyone picking up a student will have to present identification before the student is released

#### **Academics**

McCormick Elementary School serves students in grades three through five. The school organization consists of heterogeneously self-contained classes in all grades. In all English-Language Arts classrooms, emphasis is placed on an integrated approach to reading and writing with a targeted focus on nonfiction text as well. Success in school and working cooperatively are emphasized at every grade level.

Our reading and math curriculum is aligned with the South Carolina College and Career Ready State Standards while our social science curriculum is aligned with the SC State Standards. The state assessment for all subjects will be administered as designated by the State Department of Education. Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) tests will be administered in the fall, winter, and spring to determine student progress over time, as well as ongoing Fountas & Pinnell assessments in reading.

Our students are able to learn and enhance technical and science skills through the usage of the computer lab and software usage in each subject area. We are excited to have a science lab for students to engage in scientific inquiry.

Our Media Center, in addition to specialist teachers in Art, Music and Physical Education further enriches the instructional program at our school. The Master Schedule provides 150 minutes per week of physical education and/or physical activity.

#### **Parent Involvement Policy**

Student achievement is significantly improved when parents take an active role in their child's education. The School Improvement Council meets each month to discuss ways to improve the school overall. The Parent Teacher Organization meets quarterly to discuss ways to raise funds to support students and teachers. Our School-Parent Compact also offers ways in which parents can support students at home. Our Parent Liaison is available to assist parents with ongoing workshops to support student learning.

#### **Guidance/Character Education**

Our School Counselor visits classes to teach lessons on character, goal setting, decision-making, getting along with others, career awareness, safety, and other important life skills. Small group sessions are offered for referred students to discuss topics such as friendship, managing grief, dealing with feelings, and social skills.

#### **Special Services**

Our school has a School Wide Assistance Team which accepts referrals/suggestions from parents and content area teachers concerning students who are experiencing educational and/or behavioral difficulties. Students whose disabilities meet state and federal guidelines will be offered special education services as determined by an IEP committee consisting of the child's parents and school personnel. Please contact your child's teacher, guidance counselor, or administrator to note a parent concern.

#### **Health Room Services**

McCormick Elementary School has a full-time nurse assigned to the school. She coordinates the school health program and acts as a liaison between school personnel, community organizations, and medical resources. The health room is set up to assist students with minor first aid and minor illnesses. The school nurse reports illnesses of students to parents and follows the school district policies and the DHEC exclusion policies for South Carolina schools as to whether a student should go home due to illness or injury. Students with a temperature of 100 or above will be sent home. All students are to be fever free for 24 hours before returning to school. In addition, any student who is vomiting will be sent home.

For student safety, we must have your current physical address, working phone number(s), and alternate emergency number on file. The health

room is also where any medication that needs to be taken during the school day is stored. The nurse is trained to assist students with medication during the school day. The school district medication permission form must be completed by a parent/guardian for all medications taken at school and a physician signature is required for all prescription medications. All student medications (including over the counter) must be in the original pharmacy labeled container. All medication (prescription and over the counter) must be brought in by an adult. Please do not send any medication with a student. The parent/guardian must assume the responsibility of informing school personnel of any changes in the medication routine or student's health status.

#### **Breakfast and School Lunch Program**

Free meals are available as outlined by the National School Lunch Program. Breakfast and lunch is free to all students.

#### **School Insurance**

The district provides free insurance coverage for all students while under the jurisdiction of the school. This insurance is secondary to the parent's primary insurance coverage.

#### **School Visits**

Parents are encouraged and always welcome to visit McCormick Elementary School. Visitors must always check in at the office upon arrival to be granted a visitor's pass. Extended visits should be arranged in advance with the principal and teacher. Parent/teacher conferences must be scheduled before school, after school, or during the teachers' planning period.

#### **Dress Code**

**Shirts:** Solid white, navy blue or red poshirts free of labels, graphics or insignias of any kind, are to be worn daily to school. Turtlenecks are allowed during winter months.

**Pants/capris:** Solid khaki color (below the knee if capri) Free of labels, graphics and insignias of any kind.

**Skirts/dresses/shorts/skorts:** Solid khaki color and no shorter than 4 inches above the knee. Free of any labels, graphics and insignias of any kind.

**Belts:** Black or brown belts must be worn within the belt loops if clothing item was manufactured with belt loops. Graphic belts with metal decorations (grommets and studs) are not allowed.

**Socks:** Matching white, brown, black, khaki or navy socks must be worn. Socks may not be worn over the pantleg.

**Shoes/footwear:** Slide sandals and flip flops are not allowed. Shoe laces, if any, must be white, black, or match the color of the shoe and they must be tied. Boots may not be worn over the pant leg. Sandals (except for flip flops and slides) and shoes with Velcro are allowed.

#### **Acceptable Use of Technology**

Marion County Schools supports the use of technology in all classrooms at all levels and in all disciplines. The District expects each staff member and student to use technology appropriately, taking care to make ethical and responsible decisions.
